WHAT IS STRENGTHENING FAMILIES GEORGIA?

Strengthening Families Georgia (SFG) represents a multi-disciplinary partnership of nearly 50 national, state and local, and public and private organizations **dedicated to embedding five research-based Protective Factors into services and supports for children and their families.** SFG is funded by the Georgia Department of Human Services, Division of Family and Children Services (DHS-DFCS), through the Federal Community-Based Child Abuse Prevention Grant Program. The Georgia Association for the Education of Young Children (GAEYC), state affiliate of the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC), administers SFG and chairs the SFG Leadership Team and Partnership.

STRENGTHENING FAMILIES GEORGIA VISION

All families with children birth through age five in Georgia have the resources and support necessary for a meaningful and successful life.

STRENGTHENING FAMILIES GEORGIA MISSION

To utilize the Strengthening Families assets-based framework of Protective Factors in all systems, programs, services and activities supporting families with young children as the approach to achieving the vision.

Five Protective Factors are the foundation of the Strengthening Families Approach. Research studies support that when these Protective Factors are well established in a family the likelihood of child abuse and neglect diminishes. Research also shows that these five Protective Factors build family strengths and a family environment that promotes optimal child and youth development.

1. Parental Resilience

Parents Can Bounce Back

2. Social Connections

Parents Have Friends

3. Knowledge of Child Development

Parents Know How Children Grow and Learn

4. Concrete Support in Times of Need

Parents Know Where to Turn for Help

5. Social and Emotional Competence of Children

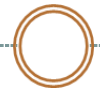
Children Learn to Talk About and Handle Feelings

BACKGROUND

In 2001, with funding from the Doris Duke Charitable Foundation, the Center for the Study of Social Policy (CSSP) began studying the role that early child care and education programs nationwide can play in strengthening families and preventing abuse and neglect. The Strengthening Families conceptual framework and approach to preventing child abuse and neglect involves building evidence-informed Protective Factors around young children by working differently with their families. The Strengthening Families approach follows a logic model to impact all child- and family-serving organizations and systems by building protective factors, using data driven decision-making, marshaling leadership and making policy and systems changes on multiple levels.

In 2006 The Governor's Office for Children and Families (formerly the Georgia Children's Trust Fund Commission) convened a group from the early childhood education and child abuse prevention sectors to develop a two-year Strengthening Families plan to utilize frontline early childhood caregivers as a means to prevent child abuse and neglect. Since 2014 SFG has been supported in part by the Georgia Department of Human Services, Division of Family and Children Services (DHS-DFCS). With continued funding and the expertise of a multi-disciplinary Leadership Team and Partnership, Strengthening Families Georgia has seen steady growth and expansion beyond early childhood, now including cross-disciplinary efforts and parent partnerships to produce changes in practices and policies.
